

FRILL-NECKED LIZARD

Chlamydosaurus kingii

The Frilled Lizard, commonly known as the frill-necked lizard, grows up to 90cm in length, about two-thirds of which is tail. Named after the large frill around their necks, which usually stays folded up against the lizard's body. When fully extended, the frill is disc-shaped and reaches over four times the length of the torso in diameter, providing an intimidating sight to any potential predator.

Frilled Lizards frequently run at high speed on two legs to escape dangers, quickly climbing the nearest tree to safety.

FOOD: Insects, Spiders, Small Reptiles and Mammals

HABITAT: Dry Woodland
